Can we determine if children labeled as "at risk" have been provided follow-up? We can't track that in the system mainly because most programs don't use the follow up feature in the system. However, as part of the agreement, they should be following up with families within 2 weeks.

Is this the only screening approved in Kansas? No, there are other screenings for specific areas. This is the Kansas adopted developmental screening.

All in For Kansas Kids Strategic Plan is being developed and opportunities for feedback are happening. The KDEC conference will have a session centered on this.

To be accredited in Kansas each school must administer data on incoming Kindergarten children. The ASQ is currently the only screener approved by the Kansas BOE.

Preschool programs are not required to use the online program but the are required to screening children within 9 months of enrollment.

114,000 children received the money
